

Neighborhood Plan Background

Menlo Park Neighborhood Plan Legal Framework

Arizona Revised Statutes

- Section 9-461.05 Mandates all municipalities in Arizona to adopt a citywide General Plan and update it every 10 years.
- Section 9-461.08 Authorizes jurisdictions to prepare Specific Plans that implement the General Plan

City Of Tucson Unified Development Code (UCD)

• The UCD defines specific plans as "a detailed policy plan or regulation that implements the General Plan or any of its elements and includes subregional, area, and **neighborhood plans.**"

Menlo Park Neighborhood Plan Why a Neighborhood Plan?



Sets the vision for Menlo Park and includes the goals and policies guiding the vision and the strategies needed to implement the goals.



Gives Menlo Park an increased ability to influence development in the neighborhood in a manner that furthers the overall intent of "Plan Tucson, City of Tucson General & Sustainability Plan."



Provides guidance for the preservation of the natural, historic, cultural, and human resources of the neighborhood, while accommodating the development needs of a growing community.



Is part of an ongoing process for achieving and maintaining a healthy and sustainable neighborhood while balancing the continuing demands for future infill development of the Neighborhood.

Menlo Park Neighborhood Plan Why a Neighborhood Plan?

The City Uses Neighborhood Plans To:



Implement the goals and policies in "Plan Tucson: City of Tucson General & Sustainability Plan," ratified by the voters in 2013;



Provide guidance in the consideration of City initiatives and projects in the neighborhood; and



Review rezonings, special exceptions, and variance requests for development in Menlo Park.

Menlo Park Neighborhood Plan Previous Neighborhood Plan Efforts

Have been working towards the preparation of the Neighborhood Plan with the Ward 1 Office since 2018 with the assistance of then Council Member Regina Romero and now with Vice Mayor Lane Santa Cruz;




Conducted neighborhood engagement efforts; and

- 1. Neighborhood Engagement
- 2. Current Conditions Assessment
- 3. Neighborhood Vision
- 4. Neighborhood Plan Preparation

Menlo Park Neighborhood Plan Neighborhood Plan Components

- VISION STATEMENT: A statement of intent or aspiration summarizing what the neighborhood would like to achieve and seeks to protect, enhance, or maintain with regard to the future
- **ELEMENTS:** The chapters of the Neighborhood Plan
- **GOALS:** General statements expressing the desired outcomes related to each element and supporting the vision statement.
- **POLICIES:** Action statements supporting the goals, providing a framework for present and future decisions, and guiding implementation strategies
- **IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGIES:** Specific actions and programs to carry out the policies














Tucson Delivers Better Streets: Proposition 101 Projects










Hydrology and Opportunities for Water Harvesting




Washes and Opportunities for Trail Connectivity







Existing Land Use




Menlo Park National Register Historic District




Zoning

Downtown Infill Incentive District (IID) Overlay Zone




Rio Nuevo Area (RNA) Overlay Zone










How Do You Prefer Receiving Information?





What I Like the Most About My Neighborhood






What I Would Like to See in the Future




Exercise 1: (5 Minutes)

- b. Select new comments.


Exercise 2: (15 Minutes Total Time)
